




The Hoyts Esquire Theatre in Melbourne was unique amongst all the city theatres that supported 70mm screenings during the late 1950s and into the 1960s. It featured a series of decorative pilasters, which were equally spaced along the sidewalls of the auditorium and which formed the vertical frames for a of "windowed", painted series landscapes. The theatre, which designed by the renowned architect, William Pitt, was constructed at 238 Bourke Street, Melbourne, on the former site of St. George's Hall. It opened as Hoyts' De Luxe on 27th March, 1915, under the direction of Arthur F. Russell - the company's founder. Its first feature film was **The Tray o' Hearts**. The theatre was renamed the Esquire on the 15th November 1946, with The Spanish Main its first attraction. The Esquire presented Bwana Devil in 3D on the 14th May 1953 and its first CinemaScope presentation was Track of the Cat, which opened on the 24th November 1955. A gala premiere of the film, Around the World in 80 Days, took place at the Esquire on the 30th

October, 1957, with the 66 week season ending on 31st January 1959. The theatre then closed for four-days, to facilitate the completion of the installation of Todd-AO 70mm (including DP70 projectors and associated 6-channel stereophonic sound system) for South Pacific; the premiere of which took place on the 5th February 1959. South Pacific's 152-week long season was the longest run in the theatre's history. The most successful 35mm season was Around the World in 80 Days (66-weeks), followed closely by The Graduate (64-weeks), which commenced on 12th September, 1968. With the opening of the three screen Hoyts Cinema Centre [the first multi-screen complex in Australia] at 140 Bourke Street, Melbourne on the 6th June 1969 with the attractions Joanna, The Thomas Crown Affair and For Love of Ivy, Hoyts Theatres then programmed their 70mm openings into the 70mm equipped Cinema Centre with *The Lion in Winter* their first opening on the 7<sup>th</sup> August 1969. Sadly the Esquire reverted to presenting 35mm presentations up to its closure in 1976. During this six year period, there was only one noteworthy presentation in 35mm at the Esquire with M\*A\*S\*H opening on the 23<sup>rd</sup> July 1970 for a 47 week season. With no 70mm presentations programmed for the Esquire, Hoyts Theatres removed the DP70 projectors and relocated them to Perth for the opening of their new Cinema 2 single screen hardtop for the opening of *Juggernaut*, ironically presented in 35mm on the 20th March 1975. The Esquire projection equipment was replaced with a pair of Kalee 21 and BTH Supa carbon arc lamp houses. Hoyts Esquire closed on the 31st March, 1976; with the double feature, White Line Fever and Chosen Survivors. The original façade remains today, hidden under a false frontage. Also the structural walls remain, with the internal shell of the Esquire demolished. The site is now occupied by a Target retail store.
