





The Greater Union Paramount Theatre was located at 525 George Street, Sydney and was built on the site of a furniture showroom (E.G. Glass & Coy. in George St.) and an adjoining warehouse to the rear and fronting Kent Street. The cinema stood next to the Victory cinema, which became known as the Rapallo cinema on the 16th December 1966 after an extensive refurbishment. Access to the cinema was via a long lobby, which ran down the northern side of the Rapallo Theatre. It then opened out into a vast single-level auditorium capable of seating 1,140 patrons. The Paramount opened on the 5th May, 1966 with The Spu Who Came in From the Cold. The theatre was equipped by National Theatre Supplies (NTS) with two dual 35/70 Victoria 8 projectors and Cinemeccanica Zenith 450 carbon arcs and one Kalee 21 35mm projector with a GK19 Westrex carbon arc. The audio equipment was manufactured by NTS in Sydney and comprised transistorised magnetic preamplifiers, valve (EF86) optical amplifiers, two cabinets of NTS 50W valve power amplifiers with KT66 outputs and power supplies providing six channels of Todd AO sound. The 5 x stage channels comprised Altec Lansing multi-cellular horns and A4 (or equivalent) and low-frequency (LF) speakers. The first 70mm presentation was the VistaVision reissue of *The* Ten Commandments on the 23rd November, 1973. The notable 35mm releases were, Alfie, Love Story, The Godfather, The Sting and the 70mm releases of Grease and Raiders of the Lost Ark. A Dolby CP100 and Dolby MPU with new power amplifiers was installed for the world premiere of Can't Stop the Music. Whilst the same stage speakers were retained at the time, sub bass speakers were added. The Paramount closed in June 1983 with An Officer and a Gentleman and was later demolished (along with the Rapallo) prior to construction of the new Greater Union Centre on George Street – a four screen multiplex. It is important to note that two seasons of *Gone* with the Wind were not advertised as screening in 70mm. Accordingly, the film title details will remain highlighted in BLUE cells until confirmed either way. In addition, the release of Star Trek: The Motion Picture and The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas in 70mm has been questioned by 70mm enthusiasts. In the case of Star Trek, it is possible that the film opened in 35mm and a 70mm print was substituted later in the season. I (DL) can confirm, however, there was a 70mm spool of Star Trek found in the Greater Union projection room when the Hoyts Corporation operated the George Street cinemas. As such, the season and screening details will remain until confirmed otherwise.
