

CONCERT BY THE ABERDEEN DOMINOES.

A high class troupe of 15 concert artistes from the Aberdeen lines Themislocles gave a surprisingly good entertainment at Thompson's Avro Picture Drome, Bullmba, on Thursday. A crowded audience enjoyed the efforts of the party, who are regarded as among the best variety performers on the high seas, and who ou this occasion had the advantage of excellent lighting effects. The artistes included Bryden and Wood, in American novelities; W. Sproule, in burlesque Italian minicry; L. Berrill, in ballads and light comedy; C. H. Trotman, comedian and dancer; Holdham and Shillingiaw, in American ragtime and dances; H. M'Courty, barttone, from principal London halis; Darmanap, Ramsey, and White, expert mandolinists; Harry Moss, comedian; W. Mizen, sifficur, in bird initiations; D. W. Chapple, solo planist and accompanist; and J. W. Hall, a London comedian.



The **Avro Theatre** is located in the inner Brisbane suburb of Bulimba - four kilometres northeast of the CBD and on the southern side of the Brisbane River. The original 'theatre' comprised a secured paddock, which sloped up from Oxford Street, with the screen located at the street-front end of the block and the bio housed in a tin shed at the rear of the block. After opening in 1912, the open-air theatre closed permanently shortly after the end of WWI. A new theatre was built on the adjoining block of land around 1920. The new theatre - known as the Avro Picture Drome comprised a timber structure and weatherboard frontage. The theatre's name derived from a nearby airfield. The earliest advertisement of the Avro Picture Drome [see left] was found in the Brisbane Telegraph dated the 19th March 1921. The theatre also operated as the **Avro** Picture Palace and the Avro Picture **Theatre**. The structure was, however, shortlived. A new theatre opened as a covered, hardtop theatre in 1926. Set back from Oxford Street, the new theatre was far more ornate than its predecessor. At the time of opening the theatre was operated by Henry Thompson and his family as a single-level auditorium with sloping floor. Following Thompson's death in 1947, directorship of the theatre fell to Henry's son, Alexander. It was under Alexander's directorship that the theatre underwent major structural changes, with the addition of a foyer and four shops added to the theatre in 1954. The shops provided an important revenue stream during the leaner years following the introduction of television. A new, wide screen

was installed in October 1954. The first film to utilise the new screen was the comedy. It Should Happen to You. When Alexander died (a mere ten years after Henry), his son - Warren - assumed joint management of the Avro with his mother. Warren was responsible for many improvements to the theatre, including the installation of 70mm; as the second suburban theatre in Brisbane to be equipped for wide-gauge presentations. The Avro was fitted out with modified Kalee 7 projectors, with the operating system in reverse. The mechanical side of the projector became the operating side, with extended drive shafts and 70mm only gates and sprockets manufactured by Cummings and Wilson. Notable 70mm screenings at the Avro Theatre between 1967 and 1970 included: The Great Race plus The Miracle of Todd-AO, and exclusive, "first time in 70mm in Brisbane" screenings of **Doctor Zhivago**, **Zulu** and **Becket**. It was during this period that the theatre underwent several name changes - firstly, in 1968, to the Avro Garden Cinema and, then, to the Cinema Balmoral in 1971. The theatre was sold to Leo Catalano - owner of the nearby Hawthorne Cinema - in 1990. Catalano retained Warren Thompson as Manager. The Avro Theatre has survived to the present day - having incorporated the Avro as Cinema 1 of the now 6-screen **Balmoral Cineplex**.
