

Her Majesty's Theatre was located at 193 Queen Street Brisbane and adjacent to the Wintergarden, Odeon and Regent theatres. It opened as Her Imperial Majesty's Opera House on the 2nd April, 1888 with a performance of "Held by the Enemy." For much of its life as a legitimate theatre, Her Majesty's operated under the J. C. Williamson banner. Other forms of entertainment were introduced, including ballets, repertory theatre (including drama and comedies), vaudeville acts and even boxing bouts. The theatre's name changed to His Majesty's


Theatre upon the death of Queen Victoria in 1901. An article in *The Brisbane Courier* on the 6th April, 1929 (page 19) indicated that Hoyts 'Talkies' would commence screening films and that preparatory works were already under way. Supported by a Western Electric sound system, the opening film was *Mother Knows Best*. The film ran for three weeks – closing on the 17th May. However, His Majesty's life as a cinema was short-lived, with its sound equipment transferred to the Lyceum Theatre in George Street. During the 1930s, 40s and 50s the theatre often alternated between legitimate theatre, opera, ballet and cinema. Following the ascension of Elizabeth II to the British throne in 1952, the theatre's name eventually changed to **Her Majesty's Theatre**. In 1965, Warner Bros were in need of a theatre in Brisbane in which to screen *My Fair Lady*. Brisbane's major 70mm theatres were fully occupied at the time. Her Majesty's closed for the installation of two Todd-AO DP70 projectors and a six-channel stereophonic sound system for the 70mm release of *My Fair Lady*. The film opened at Her Majesty's Theatre on the 1st December, 1965. The film ran for 33-weeks before closing on 13th July,



1966. Ironically, the stage version of *My Fair* Lady had also taken place at Her Majesty's in Brisbane - in both 1961 and (again) in 1970. During the period of the Roadshow Engagement [1958 to 1974], there were three other 70mm openings at Her Majesty's -Russian Adventure, Tora! Tora! Tora! and Song of Norway. After the theatre was sold to the AMP Society in 1973, Her Majesty's included music concerts, including Blondie (1973), Little River Band (1976), INXS (1980) and Cold Chisel (1982). The theatre closed its doors for the final time after the Lord Mayor's Command Performance on the evening of Sunday, 16th October, 1983. Her Majesty's theatre, the Wintergarden and Odeon cinemas were demolished and the sites are now occupied by the Hilton Hotel Wintergarden Shopping Centre.
