• THE RUSH to new physical widths for our pictures poses a great sign of danger. For years the screen size re-mained the same; now there are changes being planned almost every

Seemingly every major production outfit wants to be alone in the development of new widths. All seem to feel the new width they are working on is going to be the only answer. None has any desire, at this point, for a stand-ardization. Confusion is rampant and the results might end up disastrously.

Let's look at the score to date.
Todd-AO is coming out with a
70mm width with the release of its
"Oklahoma!" MGM is building cameras and other equipment for 65mm production. Twentieth-Fox will start its first picture on 55mm in a few days. Paramount is showing signs of jumping its "Lazy-8" aperture to a wider screen, and goodness knows what's going on in the minds of the rest of the plants. Why?

With the launching of CinemaScope and its size, 20th broadcast the information that this was "the ultimate in screen size." This company must have upward of \$100,000,000 invested in C-Scope negatives and equipment, to say nothing of what the theatres of the world have invested in the projection apparatus to screen it. Paramount has just now started its full growth with its VistaVision. There, too, is a big in-vestment in films and equipment. Why would these two companies move into bigger widths, jeopardizing what they already have, spending money for the new and adding more confusion to the exhibitors' screen problem? What's wrong with what they have and what the theatres have equipped for? Is this wider film of such greater importance, and if so, why don't they get together on a standardization?

We can understand the Todd-AO 70mm jump. That move has reason because the company is new, has no other width investment, with the process creating the need of this wide film. But why should MCM be rushing into 65mm with tremendous investments in with the rest and all agreeing that a new look is now necessary and that the new width should be 55, 65 or 70mm?

With most companies showing greater profits than ever before, is all this width confusion necessary to hold and increase those gains?
